What does it mean to be young, American, and white at the dawn of the twenty-first century? Challenging reductionist notions of whiteness and white racism, this study suggests how we might go "beyond whiteness" to new directions in antiracist activism and school reform. *Shades of White* is emblematic of an emerging second wave of whiteness studies that focuses on the racial identity of whites.
