The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) required the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to develop regulations protecting the privacy and security of certain health information. 1 To fulfill this requirement, HHS published what are commonly known as the HIPAA Privacy Rule and the HIPAA Security Rule.

The minimum necessary requirement is not imposed in any of the following circumstances: (a) disclosure to or a request by a health care provider for treatment; (b) disclosure to an individual who is the subject of the information, or the individual's personal representative; (c) use or disclosure made pursuant to an authorization; (d) disclosure to HHS for complaint investigation, compliance ...

HIPAA also allows a health care provider to determine, based on professional judgment, that treating someone as a patient's personal representative for HIPAA purposes would endanger the patient, and to refuse to treat the person as a personal representative under those circumstances. This applies whether the patient is an adult or a minor child.

This element of the HIPAA guidelines on telemedicine is contained within the HIPAA Security Rule and stipulates: Only authorized users should have access to ePHI. A system of secure communication should be implemented to protect the integrity of ePHI.

The general requirements of HIPAA Security Standards state that covered entities must: 1. Ensure the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of all electronic PHI the covered entity creates, receives, maintains, or transmits. 2. Protect against any reasonably anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of such information.
