Teaching basic literacy to ESOL learners

Speigel and Sunderland (2006:15) define a basic literacy learner as " someone who is still learning to read a short simple text and struggles to write a simple sentence independently. " These learners are by no means a homogenous group: They may be learning to read and write (in any language) for the first time when they join an ESOL class.
